## Society Establishment and Setup Guidelines

## Prerequisites for new societies



- I. The purpose of the society that to be established should not already be part of an  $\nearrow$  already existing society.
- II. The society should serve the interests of a significant part of the student population.
- III. The society should be an open organization and should serve a social function.
- IV. The society composition in terms of society members is subject to negotiation and agreement between the new society and the RASA Board.
- V. At least 3 people, who will become the founding board members, should be equally and thoroughly involved in the establishment of the new society.

## <u>Setup</u>

1. Society proposal:

Include at least the following:

- Mission Statement: the purpose and profile of the society condensed in one sentence
- What will this society add to the RASA community?
- The fulfillment of prerequisites
- Board structure including task division
- Society structure
- Agenda for coming semester including plans and ideas.
- Budget proposal: an approximate description of the costs of the activities included in the society's plan and the possibilities of raising the necessary funds.
- Event description of 2 major events and/or description of regular meetings
- 2. (Oral) presentation of proposal to the RASA board.
- 3. Decision and feedback given by the RASA-board. Optional: revision of the original Society Proposal after feedback from the RASA board.
- 4. Approval budget by GA.
- 5. Trial period of 4 weeks.
- 6. Evaluation of trial period by society board and RASA-board in which the society board and the RASA board will see whether the society has lived up to the expectations and whether a solid member base has been established.
- 7. Society establishment.

Any other conditions and arrangements required by particular societies are to be discussed with the RASA Board.
